OSSTF - Provincial Election Readiness

With the upcoming provincial election just around the corner, it is time that OSSTF and its members turn their attention towards making a change in our provincial government. With recent announcements by the government to eliminate license plate renewal fees, remove COVID-19 mandates, remove tolls on highways 412 and 418, it is clear the Conservatives have turned their focus towards being re-elected as a majority government.

We cannot forget that it took a considerable effort in the last round of bargaining to push back against a Conservative government whose goal was to increase the average class size to 28:1. While settling at an average class size of 23:1 did have an impact on the staffing here in District 13 — Durham, know that without our collective efforts, it would have been a

much more severe impact had it remained at 28:1.

It would be hard to forget the way this majority Conservative government navigated their way through the COVID-19 pandemic. Arguably, many decisions were made with a political impact in mind as opposed to the health and well -being of the citizens of Ontario. I am sure none of us will forget how much impact this government has had on the professional lives of education professionals across the province at every turn.

The actions undertaken by the Conservative government illustrate how closely linked the upcoming provincial election is with the next round of bargaining collective when our agreement expires on August 31, 2022. When it comes time to negotiate a new collective agreement, it would be useful to have a new government at that table or even a minority government.

We are looking for members to consider what they would

be willing to do to help turn a majority Conservative government into a minority one or perhaps removing them as government altogether. Consider giving 4 hours of your time for 4 years of labour peace. Every small action can make a difference and there are three ways members can become involved in the provincial election: voting, volunteering, and donating. You can do this in


tiny, small, medium and large ways. Tiny ways to get involved would include making sure you are registered and vote for the OSSTF-endorsed candidate your riding. Small activities could include donating \$20 to an education-friendly political candidate, sharing a social media post related to the OSSTF Education Platform, (see graph below) or talking to a friend or family member about challenges that you are facing in education and why a new government is needed. medium action is something like attending the Ontario | Federation of Labour Day of Action on May 1st, helping an OSSTF-endorsed candidate on their campaign for four hours or attending an OSSTF event for the election. A large action would be to get 10 of your friends to vote for an education -friendly candidate and making sure they vote, volunteering for at least two days of canvassing OSSTF-endorsed for an candidate, or completing a number of the actions mentioned above.

Oshawa MPP Jennifer French has been officially endorsed for re-election by OSSTF. Please consider supporting her re-election campaign to ensure that the next 4 years in education are not like the last. More education-friendly candidates will be endorsed by

OSSTF in the weeks leading up to the provincial election. Please stay tuned for candidates in your area.

It is possible to make an impact within our local ridings. At the time of this article, current polls reflect a Conservative majority government. In the Oshawa riding. OSSTFendorsed candidate and current MPP, Jennifer French, is in a battle to retain her seat against the Conservative

candidate. In the Ajax riding, the sitting MPP, Rod Phillips, is not running for re-election and this riding could see a turn from the Conservatives. These are just two ridings where our members could impact the results of the provincial election. Remember that we can all make an impact on the election in tiny, small, medium and large Consider what actions you can take to ensure four years of labour peace.

When an office position became vacant. vour District 13 Executive made the decision to restructure the portfolios of the office staff to include antioppression and equity as a top priority. We are literally putting our money where our mouths when it comes are committing to restructuring how we do business. In addition to this new portfolio, a new Anti-Oppression and Social Justice Lead position on Executive has been established to ensure that we are truly providing space and voice at the decision-making table of our union! Kokhulani Yasodaran has been appointed to this position.

Kokhulani and I have been actively challenging our union to do better when it comes to access, voice and leadership opportunities for our rights and equity seeking members. We are pleased to say that to date, District 13 is listening and change is happening.

In addition to the new office staff portfolio and our Anti-Oppression and Social Justice Lead position on Exec, our District has established some advisory committees and an Anti-Oppression umbrella Social Justice Collective. The purpose of all of these committees is to provide opportunities for folks to come together to support each other, advocate for change and find space for voice and leadership in their federation.

Our Indigenous Collective was the first to be established and meets informally around once a month. Our Black Advisory Committee is well established and has proven to be a powerful voice in pushing for changes. They have moved action items forward to the Executive and are being heard. District 13

welcomes our members to join either of these committees at any time. Other equity-seeking groups are also encouraged to create their own advisory committees. There has been interest expressed to form Jewish, Queer, Neurodiverse, and Women's advisories by individuals looking for others to ioin them to create committee. Please reach out and help us make this happen!

Finally, under Kokhulani's leadership, have also we established an Anti-Oppression & Social Justice Collective. This group is a collective of all rights and equity seeking identities coming together in empowerment for change! To date, the group has met twice and has been an incredibly supportive space providing folks with an opportunity to share lived experiences and begin to identify areas of need in the hopes of advocating for change.

While this is just the beginning of our journey, District 13 is pleased with our new direction and welcomes the full participation of all members to ensure we can continue this important work.

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Lifting COVID-19 Health & Safety Measures in Schools

The most recent direction from the Ministry of Education lifts the health & safety measures that were in place to protect staff and students from the spread of COVID-19. This has caused another level of angst amongst our membership.

In anticipation of the removal of health and safety measures, District 13 sent a survey to members to gather feedback for OSSTF and to share with the Board around their thoughts on the removal of masking mandates. That survey indicated that 60% of the members who responded were not comfortable with the mandates being removed. These results were shared with the Durham Public Health Unit. the Director of Education and the Chair of the Board.

Additionally, District 13 OSSTF sent a letter to the Durham Region Medical Officer of Health, Dr. Robert Kyle, and copied to the Director of Education. This letter advocated for COVID-19

safety measures to remain in place within Durham schools until the end of the school year.

Provincial OSSTF has continued meet weekly with epidemiologist, Dr. Amy Greer, and other experts in ventilation. Current data from the Ontario Table is reviewed Science weekly and the risk level in the various public health units across the province is assessed. Recently, Provincial OSSTF has written to the Minister of copied Education, to the Minister of Health, expressing their concerns with lifting the public health measures schools. In a COVID-19 update issued on March 10th, Provincial OSSTF indicated that at this point, it appears the decision to make masking in school settings a choice was not based on scientific evidence. In fact, the head of the Ontario Science Table says the decision was premature. This decision also runs counter to the advice from respected children's hospitals, including Sick Kids and the Children's Hospital of Eastern Ontario.

OSSTF/FEESO's goal has always been to ensure this government prioritizes member health and safety. OSSTF/FEESO will continue to advocate for measures that prioritize health and safety and, to the greatest extent possible, make our

schools. worksites. and communities, as safe as possible. We are committed to ensuring the government and Chief Medical Officer of Health deliver on their promise to continue the provision of high quality masks for staff, including N95 masks, and for students, as well as access to rapid antigen tests. In addition, we still believe it is both prudent and necessary to maintain infection prevention and control measures currently in place at schools, including screening, masking, isolation protocols, air quality measures, and physical distancing during lunch and breaks.

The Durham District School Board has made a commitment to continue providing non-fitted N95 masks for any staff who choose to continue masking and three-ply masks for students who choose to continue masking. The Board is still required to report school absences and they will continue to report school absences that exceed 30% of the school population to Durham Region Health Department.

The complete COVID-19 updates provided by Provincial OSSTF, which include some of the information noted above, can be found in Update #29 on March 3, 2022 and Update #30 on March 10, 2022.

In one respect, it has been a quiet winter for ARM Chapter 13/16. No group events were held. 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District 13 is excited to introduce the OSSTF/FEESO Women's Advocate program. This program was created to support members of OSSTF/FEESO by promoting awareness of domestic violence, and by connecting members who are experiencing domestic violence or who know someone experiencing domestic violence to community services that can help.

Women's Advocates provide:

- confidential support to members to find help when a member or someone in their family is experiencing domestic violence
- information on how to reach a supportive counsellor or a domestic violence worker in their community
- help and contacts to locate legal advice, shelters, or other community resources
- information on types of leaves or assistance available from employer and union
- assistance when dealing with union representatives and/or employer

There are four Women's Advocates in District 13. They are members of OSSTF who volunteer outside of their regular workday to respond to calls for assistance. Advocates have been jointly trained by OSSTF/FEESO and the University of Western Ontario's Centre for Research and Education on Violence Against Women.


Visual Arts, Senior, Grade 11-12 category, here is how the judges described Caitlin's work:
